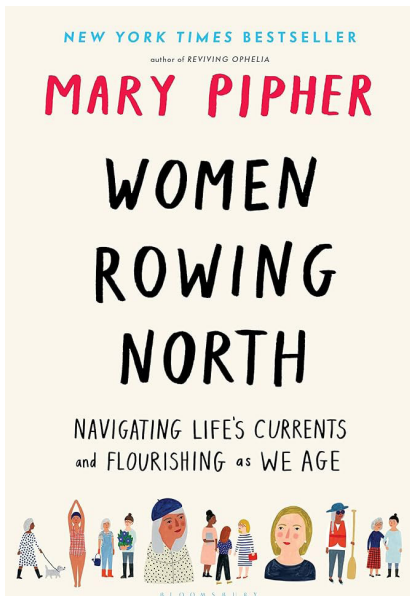

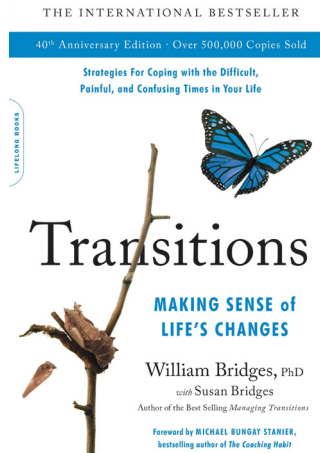

SACRAMENTS IN THE PRESBYTERIAN TRADITION

What do Presbyterians mean when we say that the sacraments of Baptism and Communion are a visible sign of an invisible grace? In this experiential class, we will learn by doing. Using a teaching liturgy, the Revs. Rachel Pedersen and Rebecca Kirkpatrick will walk through the sacraments step by step—acting out the ritual actions while pausing to reflect on their theological meaning. Along the way, we'll explore how water, bread, and cup communicate God's promises; how the sacraments shape identity and community; and why Presbyterians emphasize God's initiative over human effort. This class is designed for those who want a deeper, embodied understanding of the sacraments at the heart of Reformed worship.

MARIAN: THE AMERICAN STORY

Celebrate the life, music, and career of world-renowned contralto Marian Anderson. Jillian Pirtle, opera and musical theater artist and CEO of the National Marian Anderson Museum and Historical Society, will perform and share videos and artifacts from the museum to illustrate how Ms. Anderson used her voice and art to overcome racial barriers and advocate for equality and justice. JESUS THE KING IN THE GOSPEL OF JOHN

Join Dr. Diane Chen, New Testament scholar at Eastern University, for an in-depth exploration of kingship in the Gospel of John. Dr. Chen's teaching and research focus on the Gospels, early Christian interpretation, and the theological worlds of the New Testament. In this class, she will examine how John presents Jesus as king in striking ways—despite the absence of the infancy narratives found in Matthew and Luke. Through close attention to key texts, literary themes, and historical context, Dr. Chen will show how John affirms Jesus' messianic, Davidic identity. Together, we will consider how John reshapes our understanding of kingship, authority, and what it means to confess Jesus as Lord.

JESUS THE SERVANT IN THE GOSPEL OF JOHN

Join Dr. Joshua Yoder, New Testament scholar, for a close look at Jesus as servant in the Gospel of John. While John is often associated with high Christology and exalted language, it also offers one of the clearest portrayals of Jesus' humble, self-giving service. Dr. Yoder will explore how service, love, and obedience define Jesus' identity and mission in John. This class will examine key passages that reveal how servanthood is not a contradiction of Jesus' authority, but its deepest expression, shaping both discipleship and the life of the church.

PRESBYTERIANS AND THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

As the nation prepares to mark the 250th anniversary of the American Revolution, join Dr. Heath Carter of Princeton Theological Seminary for an introduction to the historical connections between the Presbyterian Church and the Revolution. A leading historian of American religion, Dr. Carter will outline how Presbyterian beliefs, church governance, and clergy intersected with revolutionary ideas about liberty, authority, and self-rule. This class will explore why Presbyterians were often associated with

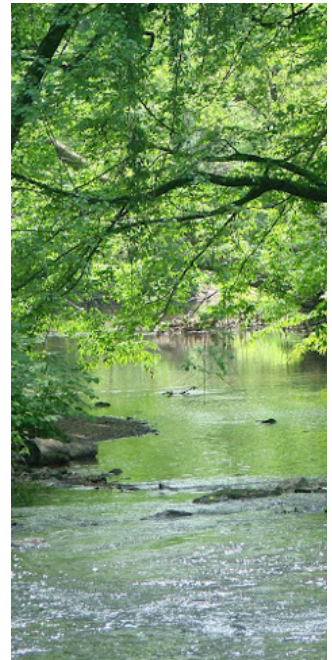
revolutionary sympathies, how sermons and congregations shaped political imagination, and what role Presbyterian networks played in colonial and early American life. The class will offer an engaging overview of how faith and revolution became intertwined—and why Presbyterians were so visible during this formative moment in American history.

DARBY CREEK WATERSHED

In this session, we'll learn about the watershed's history, current environmental challenges, and ongoing restoration efforts that protect water quality and wildlife habitat. We'll also discuss practical steps individuals and congregations can take to care for this vital resource. Come discover how stewardship of our local watershed supports the flourishing of our community and reflects our commitment to creation care.

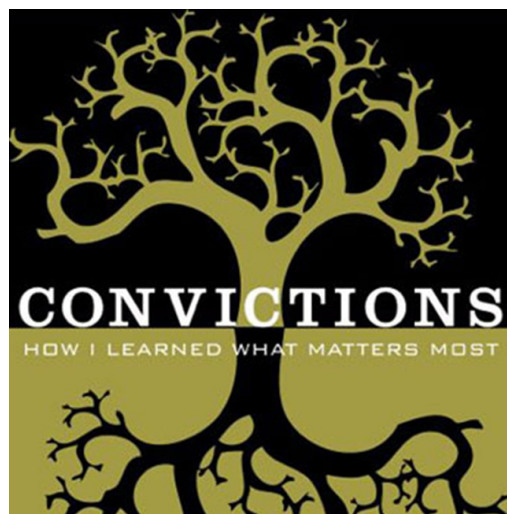
MEN'S DISCUSSION GROUP

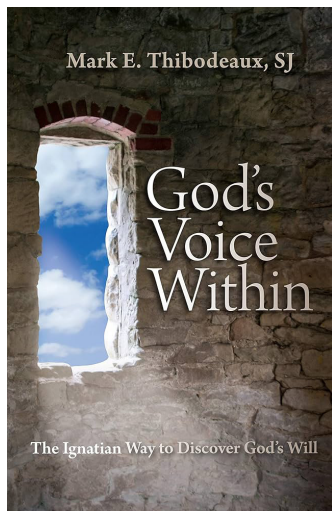

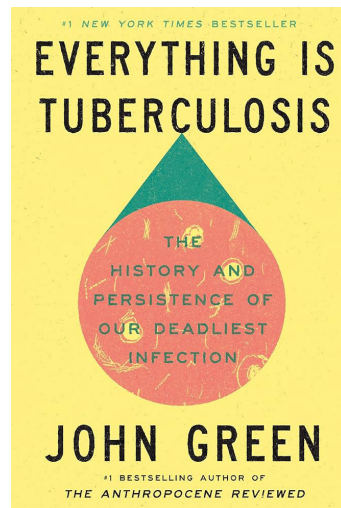

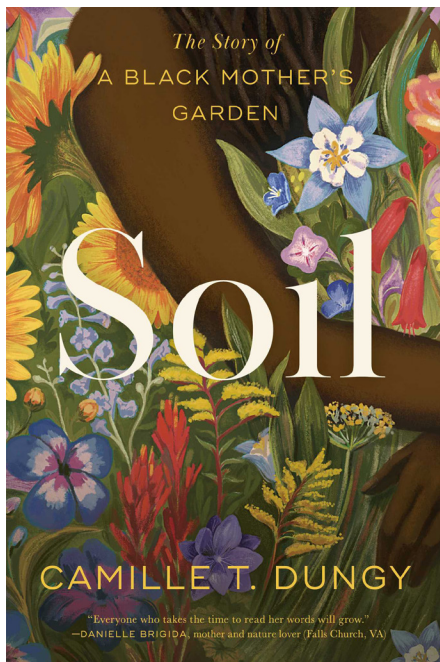
