

Worship Notes

SANCTUARY FLOWERS

CALL TO WORSHIP AND PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Today's call to worship and prayer of confession are taken from Call to Worship: Liturgy, Music, Preaching, and the Arts, volume 59.1.

TODAY'S MUSIC

I chose the music for this morning's service for very personal reasons. Bach's monumental "Passacaglia in C minor" is akin to a sculpture carved out of granite. Using the traditional Baroque dance form called "passacaglia" (an eight bar theme heard alone on the pedal at the beginning of the work), Bach creates 20 variations and adds an astonishing double fugue to cap it off. For me, this may be Bach's finest work for the organ. I have had the pleasure of conducting Brahms' "A German Requiem" numerous times (most recently, two years ago here at BMPC). The fourth movement "Wie lieblich sind deine Wohnungen" (How Lovely is Thy Dwelling Place) is the most beloved of all the movements. I conducted it on my first Sunday as Director of Music and Fine Arts. (I recall heading home after church thinking, "Wow, that's MY choir!") Its setting of verses from Psalm 84 is a great contrast to all that has gone before and is a delightful contemplation of the joys of heaven. The lilting, 3/4 time makes it positively waltz-like. Gabriel Fauré composed "Cantique de Jean Racine" at the age of 19. Jean Racine was a 17th-century French dramatist and one of the few poets to achieve fame outside his native country. Racine's sublime text of praise is set perfectly by the youthful Fauré. The postlude on my first Sunday was Olivier Messiaen's "Dieu Parmi Nous" (God Among Us). This final movement of Messiaen's nine-movement Nativity Suite gathers everything together into a triumphant close. First comes the descent of God to earth (played on a thunderous pedal); then a few serene bars telling of the "sweetness of communion." The music becomes increasingly impassioned ("the exulting of the soul") until a dazzling toccata signals the Incarnation.
