



FIRST LESSON Isaiah 35:1-10

The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad; the desert shall rejoice and blossom; like the crocus it shall blossom abundantly and rejoice with joy and shouting. The glory of Lebanon shall be given to it, the majesty of Carmel and Sharon. They shall see the glory of the Lord, the majesty of our God.





Worship Notes

TODAY'S MUSIC

Today's anthems come from sources hundreds of years old. "Gaudete" is thought to have been composed in the 16th century (it first appeared in a 1582 collection of carols published in North Germany). Its Latin text follows a typical medieval pattern of verse and refrain. Most medieval carols focused on Mary, with others focused on various saints.

John Rutter, arguably the most beloved arranger of Christmas carols, has added extra beauty to the ancient carol "O Come, O Come Emmanuel." This hymn has its origins in the series of "O Antiphons" (O Sapientia, O Radix Jesse, and several others) that were chanted as early as the 8th century at Vespers on the days leading up to Christmas—each one invoking an aspect of Jesus.

In 1851, an English clergyman, John Mason Neale, adapted these ancient texts as an English poem, O Come, O Come Emmanuel, and it was then set to the melody of a 15th-century plainchant hymn, Veni, Veni Emmanuel. Rutter's arrangement is straightforward and effective, beginning with an unadorned version of the hymn in its beautiful simplicity.
